

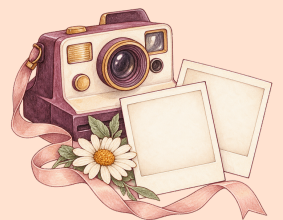

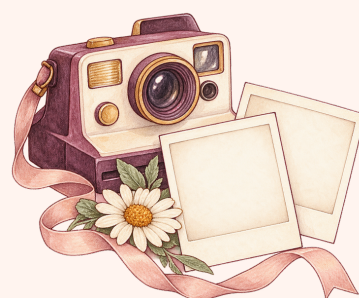
## The missing slipper

# More adventures together

Because Mabel is very much with her family, her book includes two extra pages of ideas shaped around the details they shared: short legs, love of sniffing, enthusiasm for food, a favourite beach and a talent for family rituals.

## How these ideas are created

AI helps suggest possibilities from the pet's answers, then the family chooses what genuinely suits their pet. The section is not veterinary advice. Activities should always be adapted for age, health, mobility, temperament, weather and professional advice.



Mabel's ideas use her real preferences as inspiration - not a generic list for every dog.





# Little adventures

Six gentle ways to enjoy Mabel's everyday world.



## 01 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### The three-stop sniffari

On a short route Mabel already enjoys, let her linger at three familiar sniffing spots. Follow her pace rather than adding distance. Afterwards, the family can write a funny review of the walk in her voice.

**Keep: the place she investigated longest.**

## 02 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### Blue-blanket club

Choose a quiet family afternoon and leave her favourite blanket in its usual comfortable place. Let Mabel decide whether to join. Notice how she settles, who she sits beside and that first sleepy expression. No posing needed.

**Keep: one relaxed photo and the date.**

## 03 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### A garden field notebook

From a comfortable spot, watch one of Mabel's familiar garden patrols. Draw a simple map showing where she pauses and where she likes to rest. The observations can be funny, ordinary or surprising; let her routine lead.

**Keep: her unofficial job description.**

## 04 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### Her perfect ordinary day

Take three natural photographs across an ordinary day: morning, afternoon and evening. Ask each person which moment feels most like Mabel. Put the pictures in order with one sentence each, including the tiny detail only your family notices.

**Keep: a three-picture mini chapter.**

## 05 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### The beach memory replay

Start by choosing a photograph from a beach day she enjoyed. Retell what happened before and after the picture. If you return another day, let comfort and conditions decide the plan; a familiar short visit is enough.

**Keep: the funniest detail outside the frame.**

## 06 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### Mabel's family awards

Give everyone a sheet of paper and invent an award based on a real habit: finest blanket guardian or most persuasive head tilt. Explain the memory behind each nomination. Display the paper awards beside photos, without dressing Mabel up.

**Keep: the winning title and its story.**

## 07 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### One-photo Friday

For four weeks, save one unposed Mabel moment each Friday. Try a different setting or expression each time: the doorway, a quiet walk, a nap or a welcome home. Add the date and a sentence while the memory is fresh.

**Keep: four different pictures, four captions.**

## 08 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### The Mabel dictionary

Collect her nicknames, family sayings and the words everyone uses for her habits. Ask who first said each phrase and why it stuck. Add a little drawing or a photograph to the entries that deserve their own explanation.

**Keep: five phrases only your family knows.**

## 09 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### A voice-note time capsule

Invite each family member to record a short Mabel memory in their own voice. Ask where it happened, who was there and what she did next. Save the date and speaker's name with the recording and keep a backup.

**Keep: a favourite line beside its photo.**

## 10 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### Then, now and always

Choose an early photograph and a recent one showing a familiar habit. Notice what has changed and what has stayed wonderfully the same. Compare the memories rather than making Mabel recreate a pose; the real moments are the point.

**Keep: two photos and three observations.**

## 11 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### A tiny family exhibition

Choose six different photographs together and give each a warm, funny title. Arrange copies on a table or in an album. Let each person tell one story that the picture leaves out. Use prints you already have if preferred.

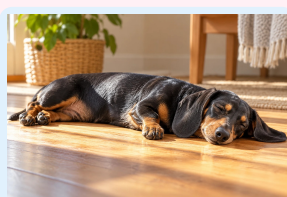
**Keep: a title, a storyteller and a date.**

## 12 / FREE FAMILY IDEA

### The next little chapter

Choose one of these ideas for a day that feels easy. Write who will take the picture and who will collect the words. When it is done, add a sentence about Mabel's favourite part. Leave space for the next ordinary adventure.

**Keep: one new memory, without a deadline.**
